Comparatives and superlatives of two-syllable adjectives

Two-syllable adjectives which end in *-y*, *-ow*, *-le* and *-er* usually take *-er* in the comparative and *-est* in the superlative.

Remember that *y* changes to *i* before *-er* and *-est*, and that if the adjective already ends in *-e*, you just add *r* and *st*.

	comparative	superlative
funny	funnier	funniest
narrow	narrower	narrowest
simple	simpler	simplest
clever	cleverer	cleverest

For other two-syllable adjectives, use *more* and *most*:

afraid	more afraid	(the) most afraid
patient	more patient	(the) most patient

You have to use *more* and *most* with some one-syllable adjectives, like *shocked* (*more shocked*, *the most shocked*), but there aren't many of them – fortunately!
